## What is College Credit Plus?

#### College Credit Plus is Ohio's dual credit program

- Students can earn high school and college credit at the same time
- Provides students with choices and challenges
- Students enroll in college courses and adhere to the policies and requirements of the college



## What is College Credit Plus?

#### Available to college-ready students in Grades 7 through 12 in AY 2023-24

- Must be Ohio residents
  - Attending an Ohio secondary school (public or private)
     or
  - Receiving homeschool instruction
- May apply to any Ohio public college or participating Ohio private college (or approved out-of-state college)
  - May apply to multiple colleges
  - May attend multiple colleges



## **Participation**

- All public secondary school districts and public higher education institutions must participate
- All non-public secondary schools may participate
- All non-public postsecondary schools may participate



#### How does it work?

#### **Students in Grades 7 through 12:**

- May choose from a variety of college-level courses
  - As determined by placement testing and course eligibility rules
- Can earn credit to satisfy both high school and college requirements
  - 3 or more Credit Hour College Course converts to One High School Unit
- Students must successfully complete the courses in order to earn the credit
  - Even if a student fails or withdraws from the course, the college transcript and high school transcript will reflect the student's final grade
  - The high school transcript will match the college transcript with the course grade




#### **Enrollment Options**

#### **Locations**

- College campus
- Online courses
- High School\*

#### **Terms**

- Summer Semester
  - 3 sessions, 5- or 8-week courses
- Fall Semester
  - 16-week courses
- Spring Semester
  - 16-week courses



## How can students participate?

#### Step 1: Eligibility

- Student eligibility is determined using one or several factors defined by the state
- A student must demonstrate that they are ready for "college-level" coursework by:
  - High school GPA (typically a 3.0 in that subject area)
  - Scores on one subtest of an approved exam (typically ACT, SAT, Accuplacer, ALEKS)
- Colleges and universities will review students' scores using statewide standards
  - Once a student applies to a college or university, they will notify the student if he/she needs to do placement testing.

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## Ohio Remediation Free Standards

Readiness Area	ACT	SAT	ACCUPLACER (Next Generation)
English Sub Score	18	Evidence Based Reading and Writing 480	263 or 5 in Writeplacer
Reading Sub Score	22	480	250
Mathematics Sub Score	22	530	ALEKS 46

In addition to testing remediation free, students must meet the admission requirements for the college/university to which they are applying. Students may still be required to take course placement assessments for these subject areas.



### How can students participate?

#### **Step 2: College Admission**

- Students must apply for admission
- Students must meet admission requirements of the college
- Each college or university may have additional paperwork that the CCP student needs to complete with their application.
- Contact each college or university for their requirements. Check their website for application and paperwork.



### How can students participate?

#### **Step 3: Course Registration**

- If the student is considered eligible and has been admitted to the college, then:
  - The college will discuss course options with the student, based on assessment scores, prerequisites, and other requirements
- CCP students are required to attend a CCP orientation before their first semester in attendance.
- CCP students are required to be advised every semester.

These are state requirements.





## High School Requirements

- CCP courses can satisfy high school graduation requirements
  - School counselors can help students understand graduation requirements and CCP course substitutions
  - Some high schools have more requirements for graduation than the state minimum
- No HS graduation requirement may be waived
- CCP does not replace requirements to earn a high school diploma



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### Taking Classes

Students must complete their First 15 credit hours in Level I courses, which include:

- Transferable courses
- Courses in IT, Computer Science, Anatomy & Physiology, foreign language
- Courses that are part of a technical certificate
- Courses that are part of a 15- or 30-credit hour pathway
- Courses in study skills, academic or career success

Once a student completes the First 15 credit hours in Level I, he or she can enroll in Level II courses

 Level II courses are any other allowable college courses for which a student meets the prerequisites



#### Taking Classes

- College Credit Plus Pathways
  - Helps student get a head start in selective admission programs such as nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, respiratory therapy, radiological technology, or medical assisting
  - Helps student earn a certificate in information technology or other areas before graduating high school or soon after
- Non-allowable courses include:
  - Private applied courses with one-on-one instruction (such as performing art lessons)
  - Courses with high fees
  - Study abroad courses
  - Physical education courses
  - Pass/Fail graded courses
  - Remedial courses or sectarian/religious courses



#### **Granting HS Credit**

- Grades earned in the college course is the same grade that will be on the high school transcript
- Official grades are provided to HS for GPA/Class Rank calculations within 4 weeks after semester ends
- HS transcript must reflect each university course
- Grades earned in university courses are included in GPA/Rank
- Courses must be taken for a letter grade (no pass/fail)
- Students earn transcripted college and high school credit upon course completion
- Weighting of course grades
  - If applicable to your high school, check with your school counselor



## How many classes can students take?

- Limit of 30 credits per year, including high school courses:
  - 3 or more credit hour college course converts to one high school unit
- Calculation:
  - 30 (secondary school units x 3) = maximum CCP credits
- Limit of 120 credits maximum, even if beginning CCP in 7th grade
- Cannot attend beyond high school senior year
- Verify course choices with your school guidance counselor





# Advantages & Risks



#### <u>Advantages</u>

- Earn high school and college credit at the same time
- Experience college early to understand the expectations of college life
- Expands high school curriculum with academically challenging courses
- Pursue special interests 'in-depth'
- Financial benefits (it's FREE now!) and it saves on future tuition and textbook costs
- Opportunities for career exploration
- May reduce time to complete college degree depending on major
- Access to college campus resources
- Diverse learning environment
- Can take courses at your high school, online, hybrid, or at the University



#### Risks and Differences

- Increased academic rigor and responsibility for learning
- Reduced opportunities for participation in high school activities/athletics
- Social discomfort with course content and maturity
- Adult learning environment
- Class schedule, limited online offerings
- Impact on high school GPA and class standing
- Permanent College GPA and Transcript
- Increased travel and study time
- FERPA Regulations impact parent involvement
- Financial Obligations for course failure or withdrawal



#### <u>Differences between High School and College</u>

#### <u>Tests</u>

- High School: Tests are sometimes given weekly or at the end of the chapter
- College: Tests are generally fewer in number and cover more material

#### **Study Time**

- High School: Required homework ranges between 1 to 3 hours per day
- College: Standard rule of 2 to 3 hours of homework for every hour spent in class (3 to 5 hours per day)

#### **Knowledge Acquisition**

- High School: Information provided mostly in-class. Out-of-class research is minimal
- College: Coursework will generally require more independent thinking, more reading, longer writing assignments, and out-of-class research



#### <u>Differences between High School and College</u>

#### Grades

- High School: Numerous quizzes, tests, and homework assignments
- College: Few tests and fewer, if any, homework assignments will be used to determine final grades
  - While attendance may not be required, it is critical for success in college courses. Some instructors calculate as part of your final grade. Always read and understand your syllabi.

#### **Role of Parents**

- High School: Parents are strong advocates working closely with teachers and counselors
- College: Parent serves as a mentor and support for the student; the college views the student as independent decision-maker
- College: The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) protects student education records

#### **Accommodations**

- High School: Parents and students work with high school staff to determine what assistance or accommodations can be made for students with IEPs or 504 plans.
- College: Students must work directly with college staff to determine if accommodations are needed. IEPs and 504 plans may or may not be included in the discussions.



## What are the consequences of underperforming?

- If students fail or withdraw often, future financial aid may be impacted negatively
  - For more information, contact the college's financial aid office for details
- If students perform poorly, they may be placed on CCP Probation, CCP Dismissal or on academic probation or dismissal by the college



## <u>Underperforming Rule</u>

#### State policy for CCP Probation and CCP Dismissal

- After the end of the semester, colleges must send student grades and cumulative GPA to the secondary schools
- Secondary schools must review GPA to determine if CCP Probation or CCP Dismissal applies to each student
- If student attends more than one college, the GPAs must be averaged to determine CCP GPA



## **CCP Probation**

- If a student earns less than a cumulative 2.0 GPA in the CCP courses
- If a student withdraws from, or receives no credit for, two or more courses in the same academic term
- While on CCP Probation, the student may only enroll in one CCP course for one college term, and may not enroll in a college course in the same subject in which they previously earned a D, F or W



#### **CCP** Dismissal

- A student is placed on CCP Dismissal when the student has failed to increase his or her GPA to above a 2.0 in College Credit Plus courses during the CCP Probation term.
- Once a student is dismissed from the CCP program, the student may not enroll in college courses for the following college term.
- After one college term on CCP Dismissal, the student may submit an appeal to request the secondary school to allow the student to participate in College Credit Plus.



## What are the expenses for CCP?

- At public colleges or universities, there will be no cost to the students/families for tuition, required fees, and books
  - Some optional expenses are the responsibility of the student/family (Examples: parking, transportation)
- At private colleges or universities, there may be no cost to the students/families for tuition, required fees, and books, however students may be charged a small cost per credit hour
  - Check with the private college to see if they will charge this fee
- Students must complete an Intent to Participate form by April 1 and confirm if they will self-pay (Option A) or use state funds (Option B).



### Option A

The family/student will "self-pay" for college courses at the standard rate of tuition, fees, and textbooks:

- Under Option A, students can choose to earn college credit and high school credit OR only college credit (students must inform the school of their choice of credit for courses)
- Typically occurs once a student has gone over allotted credit hours per academic year
- Cost of program is funded entirely by student and their family
  - Tuition and fees are paid directly to the university

If a student enrolls in more than 30 credits for the year, the school will discuss with the student whether to:

- Drop the course (prior to the no-fault withdrawal date) or
- Pay for the entire course (including tuition, fees, books) at the college's standard rates



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#### Option B

All college course tuition, fees, and textbooks will be paid by the state of Ohio (supported by the school's foundation funds and the college's funds)

- Option B is the "default" or standard option for College Credit Plus
- Student earns both high school and college credit
- No cost to student and their family unless student earns a grade of W, F, NF, SF

The final date to change the election of Option A or Option B is on or before the college's no-fault withdrawal date



### **HS Athletic Eligibility**

- CCP students can be HS athletes
- Follow OHSAA guidelines
- Athletic eligibility requires students to pass five (5), 1 credit courses or equivalent per grading period Summer does not apply
- Eligibility is determined on a quarterly basis
- College midterm grades may be required for eligibility


#### Transferability vs. Applicability

Certain general education and technical courses will transfer especially from one Ohio public college to another Ohio public college

## Parent/Student Requirements


- Attend school district informational meeting or attend CCP Information night at Kent State Ashtabula on March 15

- Experience the only cadaver lab between Cleveland and Erie, PA in our Anatomy classes!
- Must meet prerequisites for courses

# Student Requirements After Admission into College Credit Plus Program

- CCP Orientation and Advising
  - CCP Orientation will be held in the summer and must be done prior to the academic advising appointment
  - All CCP students must sign the Academic Maturity Form prior to attending any academic advising appointment
- Placement Assessments
  - ALEKS Assessment (if interested in math courses)
- Follow Kent State student policies
- Attend classes and maintain a strong GPA
