Senior Spotlight PEYTON WILLIAMS



Morgan: So, where did you go to college, high school, all of that stuff? Wallace: So, I'm from Ohio I went to West Branch High School which is in Boyd Ohio I think you guys play them in sports sometimes. But I went to the University of Hawaii.

MH: Oh, that's so cool!

MW: Yeah that's where I did my undergrad and I did track and field and cross country that's how I got out there. I did my teaching degree in 7-12 language arts, student taught eighth graders, spoke seven different languages which was fun. Then my master's degree is in educational technology and I did that through Michigan State but it was an overseas cohort so I was actually in Ireland at the National University of Ireland for three summers to do that. So, I like to travel haha and it's kind of really influenced how I teach what I teach and the way I teach, and now I'm here!

MH: Wow that's so awesome! So what are the other schools that you've taught at? MW: I started right out of college at Pymatuning Valley for half a year and then I went back and taught at my Alma Mater at West Branch and then the way I got up here was I spent the last two years out at Spire Academy in Geneva kind of building out the English and computer science there. I actually was the computer science and English teacher there so that was very interesting I got to work with a lot of international kids there, but my heart is really in public ed, I'm a product of public ed and I think we need more motivated and energetic people in public ed to give you guys more opportunities so I'm very happy to be here. It's all a lot like where I grew up, just less farmy ha-ha.

MH: That's nice to hear. Why did you become a teacher?

MW: I thought that I wanted to teach little kids at first. I'm the youngest of four kids in five years so we're all really close. I give a big part of that to my mom who still has an undiagnosed illness but was sick by the time I was in sixth grade, so I kind of "mini-mommed" it. I actually played school and did fake homework I don't know why they actually listened but I was all about it I had some great teachers in fourth, fifth, and sixth grade so I thought that I wanted to do something in that age group but when I started my teaching program I found high school was really more my wheelhouse and I'm glad I made that shift. Everyone's kind of got their age group that fits them. But yeah, I've kind of always wanted to teach, I really enjoy teaching, and I like being in the classroom.



MH: What are your favorite things about teaching MW: There's the "ah-ha" moments and sometimes it's not the big ones but when it kind of clicks and people jump on board and get into things so we just did this research fair, some people that may have been dragging their feet it's nice seeing where they get to by that end product. I see where they're out and I'm just really proud of them but prouder of them noticing what they've accomplished over that time span or that they can accomplish those things. I love English obviously but I also just love learning, so I actually taught myself computer science and I'm not really using that here yet but we live in a very interesting time period with technology, how things are shifting so I think the more we can kind of talk about and bring those things into the classroom to expose you guys to what's available and what you could be part of that's really exciting too. MH: Do you have any funny memories or crazy stories? MW: Um so my very first day teaching I had a roller chair so it was like your desk chair and there was a mat. So, second period my first day there, I'm rolling over to say something to the class and caught the edge of the mat and completely fell sideways. I grabbed onto the chair and just went over, but the funnier thing was the principal came in to check on me that period and he completely caught the whole thing. His first impression of me was me hanging onto a desk for dear life and just completely falling sideways. So I had to try and gracefully extract myself from the chair and then keep going. Yeah that's a good one and just the things I kind of jot down and keep, I can't think of them off the top of my head but sort of the random little things that people say, little pieces of conversation sometimes just crack me up. Learning is supposed to be fun so I think that laughing at yourself and messing up all the time is definitely part of it. So yeah falling out of my chair, day one on the job was definitely something. 
MH: Alright well is there anything you would like to add?

REFLECTIONS IN THE CLASSROOM

How A Bill Becomes A Law

As part of the curriculum every year, Mr. Sardella gives his students personal freedom as they learn how a bill becomes a law and propose their own bill. Sitting in on first period AP Government class, consisting of fourteen students, students comprise a bill independently but with encouraged collaborative work. Over this four to five-day period of time, students get as close as they can to the bill making process. Students create their bills and then each bill is delivered to their respective chamber then to senate and house and is voted on. If the students' bill makes it further in the process, they swap and each chamber looks and votes which is then filtered into committees. Committees then look at the bill and vote through the voting process. If the bill makes it that far, it will reach the President (Mr. Notar). Mr. Sardella stated, "I hope they gain appreciation of how hard it is to get things done in this country". In an interview with junior, Matthew Sommers, he explains his views on the project. When asked what he learned from the project, Sommers states, "Processing what could possibly happen with

As a part of the panel that hears the students' ideas, Mr. Notar plays a crucial part as he acts as "The President". In an interview with Mr. Notar, he spoke about how much he loved the project year after year and stated that he was, "Impressed, the students can relate to it, for students to be able to see the process, it's much easier for them to understand when they go through this process ". In his closing statement, Mr. Notar remarks that he is, "Proud of our students for the time and effort that they put into research and presenting it in a professional manner". After witnessing a few classes, and interviewing some people involved in this project, I believe that the students learn the importance of democracy as well as persuasive speech and feel empowered to make a change and learn the process of how to do so. This creates a positive mindset and provokes the students to dig deeper into why things happen and how they happen in the world, but more specifically in the government.



Mr. Sardella teaches the students in a way that encourages them to stand up for what they believe in and to value their own opinion, using their voice to be bold and be a citizen with a say. In this class, everyone is heard and challenged to defend their point in a positive way and to express their knowledge on the subject. The comfortable environment creates an atmosphere that sparks creativity and ability to be oneself.
